Working with Large Animals and Dogs

Because children ages 5-8 lack the mental and physical skills for controlling and understanding the strength of large animals, they may not have direct contact with 4-H animals such as cattle, goats, horses, llamas, sheep and swine. Additionally, young children may not have responsibility for controlling dogs of any size within 4-H group settings.

Working with Small Animals

Learning about and interacting with small animals on a short-term basis provides a wonderful experiential learning opportunity for young children. These experiences, however, must reflect a child-centered approach and attend not only to the topics taught but also to the environment in which they are taught.
