Make sure to select Sherman County when creating your account. If you have previously been enrolled in 4-H, you already have an account with the email you have provided on your enrollment forms. You will need to create a new password.

Early bird \$30/youth enrollment fee, late enrollment addititional \$5/youth. Sorry, we're not yet set up for online payments. Stop by the office with cash or checks payable to Sherman County 4-H Assn.

4-H is for youth ages 9-19 as of September 1, 2023. Juniors are 9-11 years old (yes, this can include older third graders); intermediates are 12-14 years old; and seniors are 15-19 years old (and still in high school).

## **Extension Afterschool Programs**

As part of serving the youth in the county, Sherman County Extension offers afterschool programming as part of its 4-H outreach efforts. Tuesdays is Extension Afterschool at the Extension Building for kids 7 and up. A wide variety of activities are explored, in the hopes of "sparking" a child's interest in something, and potentially a 4-H project as well. This program started September 2020, when the school was still shut down from C19, and has included the National 4-H STEM (science, technology, engineering, math) project each October; 3DuxDesign plastic connectors and cardboard construction; lacing and leathercraft; cooking; art; stitchery and weaving; gardening; outdoor cooking; making dog and cat treats and toys; and holiday and seasonal crafts. Wednesdays is "Survival Cooking" as part of Sherman County School's SKORE afterschool programming. This cooking program started in fall 2012 at the South Sherman Elementary and continues each year, offering youth experience with a variety of foods, equipment and nutritional information while progressing through OSU Food Hero recipes for smoothies, pancakes, eggs, French Toast, breakfast burritos, grilled sandwiches and "melts", quesadillas, mini pizzas, bruschetta, rolled sandwich pinwheels, garden cakes, stir fry, soups, and more.
