New Demonstration Greenhouse and Learning Garden Update



We are fast approaching the date when we will be ordering our beautiful new greenhouse. We finally have everything in place to request our building permit, and once the permit is issued, we will be placing the order!

In case you haven't heard, we have reached an agreement with the Gold Beach Community Center to use a section of their property for our new facility. There have been a lot of preparations made to get to this point, including deciding on electrical service, water and sewer,





in addition to the exact location of the greenhouse, getting bids on different facets of the construction, fencing, accessibility, exterior walkways, outside garden beds, gates, etc. The greenhouse committee has been meeting twice a month for 2+ years planning all of the details.

There are still many details to be decided upon, and there is an active subcommittee planning the exterior spaces and demonstration gardens. We have basic benches and a big sink planned, but we will need to find the materials to construct them, find contractors to build them, figure out the irrigation system, and storage. Building School Garden Activities in School District 2CJ

There is lots going on in north Curry County!

Port Orford's Driftwood Elementary's school garden is finally bustling with new life after a long winter's rest. Students worked hard this spring seeding and transplanting starts, adding



compost, weeding the strawberries, creating a native pollinator garden bed, and so much more!

Each class at Driftwood adopted a garden bed to plant and tend to. They are currently growing strawberries, raspberries, artichokes, asparagus, herbs, brassicas, lettuce, and peas just to name a few.

In addition to tending to the garden, teachers also utilize the garden as an outdoor learning space. In collaboration with Curry Watershed's education team, students were taught lessons on vermicompost, pollinators, decomposers, ecosystem relationships, seeds, nutrition, etc.

The garden is located in the playground area, which is open to the public during non-school hours. Master

Gardener volunteers are invited to help in the garden on Fridays 12:30-2:30pm (school ends at 12:15pm on Fridays for 2CJ). Contact MG Ann Schmierer (annie5565@gmail.com) for more info!

Over at Pacific High School the Horticulture program is taking off under the leadership of Wendy Tomko! Their agricultural space on campus is sizable, and is home to several cranberry bogs (which have been decommissioned) and many animals, including goats, chickens, and rabbits. Students put in many hours this spring brainstorming what their vision is for the space and then giving it a complete makeover.

It started in the greenhouse - cleaning it out, fixing the sprinkler system and drainage, installing new siding, as well as a heater and grow lights in order to grow produce year-round. Students planted a wide range of vegetables in the greenhouse and are experimenting with hanging grow bags for strawberries and tomatoes. The animal habitats were cleaned up and given some updates (including an automatic door for the chicken coop). Drainage channels were dug in the rabbit's pen to start a small orchard which will be



planted in the fall- plums and cherries to start. Since there was not a previous outdoor vegetable gardening area on site, wood was brought in for the building of several hügelkultur beds. These mounds now inhabit one of the old cranberry bogs (which are fenced in to protect the produce from the goats - pictured with MG Laura Teague) and will primarily be used to grow food for the school cafeteria. Compost and vermicompost bins were built as well, in order to ensure the longevity of the hügelkulturs. Students are also prepping areas to raise pigs and quail in the fall.

Once the animal and vegetable garden operations are running smoothly, there are many ideas for future projects including a rain garden for greenhouse runoff, and native plant restoration in the other bogs.

Annual Plant Sale on May 11th



We had a great turnout with tons of people waiting almost an hour to get in and shop. The volunteers were ready and when we opened, people were not disappointed. We sold over 2,000 plants! Our total sales were \$10,514, with \$534 in donations.



On June 22nd, we took some of our leftover plants and planters to the Brookings Harbor Bodacious Bazaar and sold an additional \$351 there. Thank you again to all of our wonderful volunteers!



In addition, more than 100 plants from our greenhouse have been donated to support community efforts, including school gardens and plant sales of the Brookings Harbor Garden Club and the Native Plants Society of Oregon, South

Monthly Garden Tips

July is all about hot summer days. It's a good time to learn about effective, efficient watering practices. For example, reduce evaporation by watering vegetable and flower gardens in the early morning. Water deeply and infrequently to encourage root growth. Mulch also helps reduce evaporation. For more tips, see the July link below.



July is also the time to plant beets, bush beans, carrots, cauliflower, broccoli, lettuce, kale and peas for fall and winter crops.



While summer is a wonderful time to enjoy your garden, it is also a time for plant pests and diseases. Late July, begin to monitor for blight on tomatoes. Correct by pruning for air circulation, picking off affected leaves, and/or treating with approved fungicide. Fruit trees and garden ornamentals are items to also check regularly for pests. OSU has extensive information on pest/disease identification and control; the links below are a good starting reference point.

The hot days of August are an ideal time to plan for late summer and fall planting. Also the optimal time for establishing a new lawn is August through mid-September. In the meanwhile, you can plant winter kale, Brussels sprouts, turnips, parsnips, parsley and, on the Oregon Coast, spinach. In addition, plants like

cucumbers, summer squash and broccoli can be fertilized to maintain production.



Some berries (raspberries, boysenberries) can be pruned and revitalized after harvest. There are a host of fruit tree pathogens, critters and insects that may need your attention now too. Again, specific advice for berries, fruit/nut tree and ornamental shrub maintenance can be found at the August link below.

September is harvesting time, but also a time

to divide plants for propagation. Divide iris and peonies, and plant daffodils, tulips and crocus in anticipation of a beautiful spring. As the rainy season approaches, it is the perfect time to begin planting trees, shrubs and perennials. Fall planting will encourage healthy root growth over the winter. Also plant or transplant woody ornamentals and mature herbaceous perennials now.
